

St. Josephine Bakhita was kidnapped into slavery in the Sudan. Taken to Italy, she was renowned for her holiness after joining the Cannosian Sisters and the many miracles credited to her intercession immediately after her death.



St. Katharine Drexel devoted her life and family fortune to evangelization in the black community. She founded the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament to work in the African American Apostolate in the United States.



Servant of God Julia Greeley was a former slave who became Catholic in Denver, Colorado. Renowned for her piety and charity, her cause for canonization was introduced in 2016.
